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Message from Leadership

Dear Community Members,

What amazes us most about this year is the response of the ROI staff to the COVID-19 pandemic. ROI has chosen to refer to these folks as "Heroes" because they have been and continue to be.

At the time of this writing, positive diagnoses of COVID-19 have spiked beyond what the vast majority of us thought possible, yet ROI staff and people served have been kept safe. We have not lost anyone to COVID, even though we have recently had a significant increase in positive diagnoses. There is always a bit of luck involved but there is also film producer Samuel Goldwyn's adage that applies: The harder I work, the luckier I get.

ROI started planning for the pandemic BEFORE it was declared, and we started gathering PPE BEFORE it was a crisis. We started and maintained staff training and communications to keep everyone focused on the task at hand. Everything that we could do remotely we did. Of course, there is nothing remote about providing direct care in residential settings or 1:1 therapy to children with autism. That work continued with all the precautions we could think of, to go along with the guidance and requirements of the Center for Disease Control, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services as well as Kalamazoo Public Health. We are forever grateful for the guidance offered (and sometimes mandated) by the experts from these various agencies who are focused on keeping all of our citizens as healthy as possible.

We now look forward to the light at the end of the tunnel as a result of the incredible scientific work of a number of pharmaceutical companies, most notably Pfizer. The people we serve, and our staff are in an early priority group. A recent study indicated people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities are at a significantly higher risk for infection than the general population. That automatically increases the risk for our staff caring for them.

The financial support for our staff has been critical and greatly appreciated. Improved wages for ROI's heroes has been possible because of the commitments from our federal and state governments and the Community Mental Health system, especially Integrated Services of Kalamazoo. Additional support has come from pandemic emergency funds from the Kalamazoo Community Foundation and United Way of Battle Creek and Greater Kalamazoo, and from local donors giving directly to ROI. We were overwhelmed when an anonymous donor gave ROI \$20,000 so we could give gift cards to every staff in the organization, and again overwhelmed when it happened a second time.

We look forward to the end of this public health crisis and getting back to the "old days" when we could visit with friends and family and enjoy our wonderful community. Those days are coming. The people we serve often don't understand the concept of the pandemic, and ROI's staff have helped them to be safe, happy and engaged within the walls of their homes. Visits with families have been those famous "window visits" that everyone grows tired of. We cannot wait for the day when the people we support can give and receive hugs from their loved ones!

In closing, thank you ROI Heroes. You "get it done!"





Representative Payee Services program and Pooled Amenities Trust


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
Children on the autism spectrum decreased challenging behavior and learned adaptive skills to prepare them to transition back to the home through the **Children**'s **Residential Programs.**
